I went to the Toronto Zoo, reputed to be one of the largest in North America, today, which was enjoyable. I did not see any obvious kangaroo dookie but it made the title of my entry a bit cooler. The exhibits are well spread out which is nice but even with the map and brochure I was confused at times. The times they had listed to do the specific areas were a bit off track. I think I managed to see everything in a just about four hours.

The outdoor exhibits definitely bettered the indoor ones. I went through one whole pavilion section of the Malaysian exhibit that had no signs identifying the creatures. The signs in the pavilions, as well as outdoors, could have been more informative to get the visitor through the exhibits without repetition and without missing things.

None the less, the trip was well worth it as it was an easy drive of about 15 minutes to get there. The weather was perfect and the crowds not to disruptive. I have to admit to being a bit disturbed at seeing many of these animals in captivity especially those that obviously would normally cover a vast area in their daily lives.

The mating eagles in their caged facility particularly bothered me but when I saw that they had been recovered from the wild, wounded, and unable to fly capably to survive, I had to modify my concerns. The zoo had created a nest for them, not unlike the one I first saw two years ago in the wild on the Potomac river off the C&O Canal near Point of Rocks, MD. There is hope that the eagles will use the human made nest to produce offspring who can be introduced into the wild.

Also, when I heard so many people make indicating their relative lack of knowledge about the world's wildlife, I could only hope that what zoos are doing educates people. The education should help in the long term to preserve our community of animals and vegetables and even the humans that are destroying it.
